

# NoodleBib

## SIGN IN:

**Current users** must sign in to use NoodleBib.

- Enter your user name.
- Enter your password.
- Click: **Sign In**

**If you cannot remember your ID or password:**

- Click the **I forgot my password** link.
- A hint will display the first and last characters of your password: Ex. Y\_ \_ \_ \_ \_S (Yankees)
- If you still can't log in, ask the librarians for help.

## Already Have a Personal ID?

## CREATE A NEW SOURCE LIST FOR THIS PROJECT:

- Select **MLA Advanced** and name your list.
- Choose the proper citation type from the drop down list.

## Books on the cart in the library:

- Use **BOOK** for a book written about one topic, cite the whole book.
- Use **REFERENCE SOURCE** for a book that is more like an encyclopedia. These books have articles on different topics. Picking this citation lets you include the **TITLE OF THE ARTICLE** in your citation.

## World Book Online:

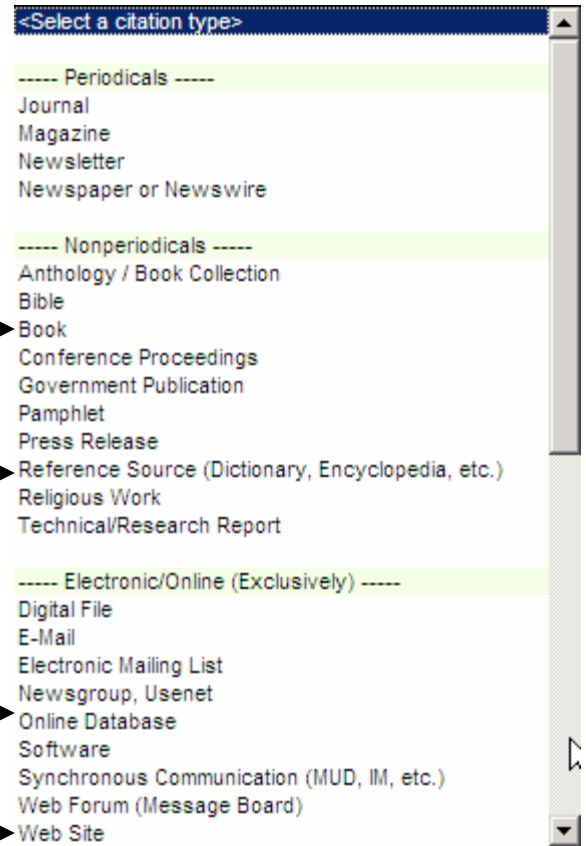
- Use **ONLINE DATABASE**.
- Original content? **YES**

## Student Resource Center:

- Use **ONLINE DATABASE** for articles found here.
- Original content? **NO**—this is a reproduction of a printed source.
- Most often you will use **REFERENCE SOURCE** for these articles. Look at the title and publication information for the original source of information. Reference sources have a publication **YEAR**. If you see a month and day, you know that your source is a magazine or newspaper.

## Websites:

- Use for the **trusted Websites** that are listed on Mr. Sharma's Body Systems page.
- **DO NOT** use this for sources you found online through a database like Student Resource Center.
- Provide as much information as you can find on the page. Look for Website name, Page title, Date of publication and Organization.
- Do NOT include the URL (www.....)
