In Jericho High School's class of 2018, 99.9% of all seniors earned Regents diplomas and 91% received Regents Diplomas Awarded with Distinction. Also, 92% of our graduates completed at least one Advanced Placement course. Jericho's percentages in these categories are among the highest in New York State.

BOE Adopts Budget That's Below Tax Levy Limit

Jericho's Board of Education unanimously adopted the proposed 2019-2020 school district budget at an open meeting on March 21, 2019. The \$124,341,752 budget represents a 1.46% tax levy increase, which is below the New York State Tax Cap. This is the first increase that the district has had in five years.

Since January, the school district hosted a series of public workshops to review the financial status of the school district and create a budget for the coming year. The Board of Education and district administration requested input from members of the school community.

Voting on the budget will be on Tuesday, May 21. If the budget is not approved by residents with a simple majority, the district can resubmit the original budget or a revised budget in June.

On the Ballot

The District is embarking on the fourth phase of a District-wide Capital Improvement Plan. On May 21, 2019 voters will be asked to vote on two additional propositions.

Proposition #2 would authorize he Board to spend \$9.9 million

from the already existing Capital Reserve III, fund balance, and a \$500,000 donation to implement the fourth-phase projects from the Capital Facilities Plan. The bulk of this portion of the plan will include funds to provide district-wide site work, fencing, playgrounds, safety surfaces, electrical upgrades, security upgrades, renovation of the HS Cafeteria, and cooling to the remainder of instructional spaces in the HS/MS complex.

Proposition #3 would authorize the Board to create an additional capital reserve (Capital Reserve IV), not to exceed \$20 million, which would be funded over the next several years, and provide funding for future capital projects.

Maintaining Programs

While preparing the budget, many strategies were considered, including keeping a multi-year, long-term perspective on the district's financial plans. All instructional programs will continue for next year, and there will also be enhancements to some of these pro-

grams.

When adopting the budget, the Board also considered the district's plan to continue technology replacement and expand technological initiatives districtwide.

Included in the budget are plans to expand the tablet initiative throughout the district and add 170 iPads and 330 Chromebooks. Almost 500 desktops will be replaced and an additional 35 laptops will be added. There are plans to replace projectors, Smartboards and printers as needed. This is all part of the district's five-year technology plan.

Board of Education Seats

There is one open seat on the Board of Education this year. Two candidates are running for this seat, which holds a three-year term. Listed in ballot order, the candidates are incumbent Pam Wasserman-Heath and Maria Sy-Rangel. There is a Meet the Candidates Night, sponsored by the PTA, scheduled for May 14, 2019 at 7:30 PM in the Little Theater.

PROPOSITIONS #2 & #3 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLANS

PROPOSITION #2

SHALL the Board Education be authorized to expend a sum not to exceed \$9,831,850 as follows (1) \$500,000 from a donation and (2) \$6.000,000 from the capital reserve fund established on May 16, 2017 and (3) \$3,331,850 from fund balance for the purpose of completing capital improvements as follows: District-wide site work, fencing, playgrounds, and safety surface; district-wide electrical upgrades and replacement; replace classroom casework and unit ventilators with heating and cooling unit ventilators at the high and middle schools; district-wide ceiling and lighting upgrades; renovation of the high school cafeteria; districtwide building energy management systems upgrades; district-wide security upgrades; all of the above to include all labor, materials, equipment, apparatus, and incidental costs associated therewith.

PROPOSITION #3

SHALL the Board of Education. pursuant Education Law section 3651, be authorized to establish a Capital Reserve Fund known as the "Facilities Improvement Program IV – Jericho Public Schools" for the purpose of district-wide replacements, renovations, upgrades, reconstruction, additions, and remediation of: roofs, exhaust fans, windows, masonry, doors, stairs, elevators, ceilings, lightings, plumbing, boilers, burners, floors, walls, bathrooms, ADA compliance, classrooms, casework, cafeteria/

kitchen, electrical service, HVAC units, air handling, unit ventilators, security, emergency generators, energy efficiency projects, additional new space/new building additions, site-work, pavement, curbs, sidewalks, courtyard, athletic fields, tennis courts, stadium lighting, bleacher/concession stands, playgrounds, lockers, locker room, gymnasium, pool, weight room, technology/communication, hazardous material remediation, bus garage, auditoriums, storage, furnishings and equipment incidental to said projects. The maximum amount of the aforesaid Capital Reserve Fund shall be \$20 million, plus investment income. The term is to be 10 years; the funds are to be transferred from surplus monies remaining in the general fund and/or from existing reserves as allowed by General Municipal Education Law including a sum not to exceed \$5 million from the 2018-2019 budget and thereafter not more than \$10 million for each remaining year of the probable term until the maximum amount of \$20 million is reached. Upon the establishment and funding of said reserve, the Superintendent of Schools or his/her designee shall be directed to deposit monies of this reserve fund in a separate bank account to be known as the "Facilities Improvement Program IV -Jericho Public Schools." Upon the establishment and funding said reserve. Superintendent of Schools or his/her designee shall be authorized to invest, from time to time, the monies of this fund pursuant to section 1723-a of the Education Law.

Voting Qualifications

Only persons who are qualified voters as of May 21, 2019 shall be permitted to vote in the election held on May 21, 2019 on matters affecting the Jericho School District and the Jericho Public Library.

A qualified voter is defined as:

- *A citizen of the United States
- *At least eighteen years of age
- *A resident in the Jericho Union Free School
 District for thirty days or more preceding the budget vote at which
 he/she offers to vote.

Persons disqualified from voting under the provisions of Section 5-106 of the Election Law are not eligible to vote in school district elections.

New voters may register and vote on the day of the election. They will be asked to provide proof of residency and age.



Proposition #5: (As it appears on the ballot)

That the Jericho Public Library, in Jericho, New York (the "Library"), is hereby authorized to construct additions, alterations and improvements to the Library, and to expend therefor \$9,000,000; (b) that a tax is hereby voted in the amount of not to exceed \$9,000,000 to pay the cost thereofe, such tax to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as shall be determined by said Board of Education of the District; and bonds of the District are authorized to be issued in the principal amount of not to exceed \$9,000,000 and a school tax is hereby authorized to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same shall become due and payable; and (c) that a Library tax is hereby authorized to be levied and collected in installments in such years and amounts as shall be determined by said Board of Trustees of the Library sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the not to exceed \$9,000,000 bonds herein referred to, and such Library tax shall offset and reduce by like amount the school taxes herein authorized.

A Note From Tina Brenner Director of the Jericho Public Library

The Jericho Public Library has become a community center for all age groups. It is a multi-functioned space that enables patrons to attend programs, study, collaborate and socialize. The Library proposes to improve, expand and renovate interior space to the present Library building to better accommodate our community. The improvements will include; additional multipurpose and quiet rooms for additional programs and quiet study; additional handicapped accessible bathrooms; new windows and the installation of a fire sprinkler system for patron safety. The construction of the new 2-story circular addition will allow for an enlarged café area, more efficient space for clerical staff, custodial area, storage and the relocation of Administration, Technology and Programming office space for a more productive work flow. The interior space renovation will be patron friendly, with more public seating and tables for patrons to sit comfortably, read and/or socialize.
